



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WEDNESDAY IN HOLY WEEK

(Mattins & Lauds of Maundy Thursday)


The procession to the choir proceeds in this order: the Master of Ceremonies, the two Cantors, the Celebrant, others of the Clergy according to precedence, then the Choir, those of greater dignity before the others. All kneel down and say the following prayer silently:

O LORD, open thou my mouth that I may bless thy holy Name; cleanse also my heart from all vain, evil and wandering thoughts; enlighten my understanding, enkindle my affections that I may be able worthily, attentively and devoutly to recite these Offices, and may be meet to be heard in the presence of thy divine Majesty. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

O LORD, in union with that divine intention with which thou thyself on earth didst render praise to God, I offer to thee these Hours.

Then all stand up and say in silence Our Father, Hail Mary and the Apostles Creed. When these are done the Cantors intone the first Antiphon which is continued by the Choir. As soon as the first Psalm has been intoned by the Cantors, all sit down and remain seated until otherwise ordered.

AT MATTINS-NOCTURN I



- 1. Save me, O God: for the waters are come in; even un-to my soul.
- 2. I stick fast in the deep mire, where no ground is: I am come into deep waters, so that the floods run o-ver me.
- 3. I am weary of crying; my throat is dry: my sight faileth me for waiting so long up-on my God.
- 4. They that hate me without a cause are more than
- the hairs of my head: they that are mine enemies, and would destroy me guilt-less, are migh-ty.
- 5. I paid them the things that I never took: God, thou knowest my simpleness; and my faults are not hid from thee.
- 6. Let not them that trust in thee, O Lord God of hosts; be ashamed for my <u>cause</u>: let not those that seek thee be confounded through me; O Lord <u>God</u> of Is-ra-el.

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- 7. And-why, for thy sake have I suffered re-proof: shame hath cov-er-ed my face.
- 8. I am become a stranger unto my bre-thren: even an alien unto my mo-ther's chil-dren.
- 9. For the zeal of thine house hath even \underline{eat} en me: and the rebukes of them that rebuked thee are fall-en up-on me.
- 10. I wept, and chastened myself with <u>fast</u>-ing: and that was turn-ed to my re-proof.
- 11. I put on sackcloth <u>al</u>-so: and they jest- \underline{ed} up-on me.
- 12. They that sit in the gate speak a-gainst me: and the drunkards make songs up-on me.
- 13. But, Lord, I make my prayer unto thee: in an ac-cep-ta-ble time.
- 14. Hear me, 0 God, in the multitude of thy mercy: even in the truth of thy sal-va-tion.
- 15. Take me out of the mire, that I sink not: 0 let me be delivered from them that hate me; and out of the deep wa-ters.
- 16. Let not the water-flood drown me; neither let the deep swallow me up: and let not the pit shut her mouth up-on me.
- 17. Hear me, O Lord, for thy loving-kindness is com-fort-able: turn thee unto me according to the multitude of thy mer-cies.
- 18. And hide not thy face from thy servant; for I am in trou-ble: O haste thee, and hear me.
- 19. Draw nigh unto my soul, and save it: 0 deliver me, because of mine e-ne-mies.
- 20. Thou hast known my reproof, my shame, and my dis-ho-nour: mine adversaries are all in thy sight.
- 21. Thy rebuke hath broken my heart; I am full of hea-vi-ness: I looked for some to have pity on me, but there was no man; neither found I a-ny to com-fort me.

- 22. They gave me gall to eat: and when I was thirsty they gave me vi-ne-gar to drink.
- 23. Let their table be made a snare to take themselves with-al: and let the things that should have been for their wealth be unto them an occasion of fall-ing.
- 24. Let their eyea be blinded that they see not: and ever bow thou down their backs.
- 25. Pour out thine indignation up-on them: and let thy wrathful displeas-ure take hold of them.
- 26. Let their habitation be void: and no man to dwell in their tents.
- 27. For they persecute him whom thou hast <u>smitten</u>: and they talk how they may vex them whom thou hast wound-ed.
- 28. Let them fall from one wickedness to a-nother: and not come in-to thy righ-teous-ness.
- 29. Let them be wiped out of the book of the <u>liv</u>-ing: and not be written a-mong the righ-teous.
- 30. As for me, when I am poor and in hea viness: thy help, O God, shall lift me up.
- 31. I will praise the Name of God with a song: and magnify it with thanks-giv-ing.
- 32. This also shall please the Lord: better than a bullock that hath horns and hoofs.
- 33. The humble shall consider this, and be glad: seek ye after God, and your soul shall live.
- 34. For the Lord heareth the poor: and despiseth not his pri-son-ers.
- 85. Let heaven and earth <u>praise</u> him: the sea, and all that <u>mov</u>-eth there-in.
- 36. For God will save Syon, and build the cities of \underline{Ju} -dah: that men may dwell there, and have it \underline{in} pos-ses-sion.
- 87. The posterity also of his servants shall in-herit it: and they that love his Name shall dwell there-in.

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
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
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






- 1. HASTE THEE, 0 God, to de-<u>li</u>-ver me: make haste to <u>help</u> me, 0 Lord.
- 2. Let them be ashamed and confounded that seek after my <u>soul</u>: let them be turned backward and put to confusion that <u>wish</u> me e-vil.
- 3. Let them for their reward be soon brought to shame: that cry o-ver me: There, there.
- 4. But let all those that seek thee be joyful and glad in thee: and let all such as delight in thy salvation say alway; The <u>Lord</u> be praised.
- 5. As for me, I am poor, and in \underline{mi} -se-ry: haste thee \underline{un} -to me, O God.
- 6. Thou art my helper, and my re-deem-er: 0 Lord, make no long tar-ry-ing.







- 1. IN THEE, 0 Lord, have I put my trust; let me never be put to con-fu-sion: but rid me and deliver me in thy righteousness; incline thine ear unto me, and save me.
- 2. Be thou my strong hold, whereunto I may alway re-sort: thou hast promised to help me; for thou art my house of defence and my cas-tle.
- 3. Deliver me, 0 my God, out of the hand of the

un-god-ly: out of the hand of the unrigh-teous and cru-el man.

- 4. For thou, O Lord God, art the thing that I long for: thou art my hope, e-ven from my youth.
- 5. Through thee have I been holden up ever since I was <u>born</u>: thou art he that took me out of my mother's womb; my praise shall be <u>al</u>-ways of thee.

- 6. I am become as it were a monster unto many: but my sure trust is in thee.
- 7. 0 let my mouth be filled with thy praise: that I may sing of thy glory and honour all the day long.
- 8. Cast me not away in the time of age: forsake me not when my strength fail-eth me.
- 9. For mine enemies speak against me; and they that lay wait for my soul take their counsel together, say-ing: God hath forsaken him; persecute him, and take him, for there is none to de-li-ver him.
- 10. Go not far from me, O God: my God, haste thee to help me.
- 11. Let them be confounded and perish that are against my soul: let them be covered with shame and dishonour that seek to do me e-vil.
- 12. As for me, I will patiently abide al-way: and will praise thee more and more.
- 13. My mouth shall daily speak of thy righteousness and sal-va-tion: for I know no end there-of.
- 14. I will go forth in the strength of the Lord God: and will make mention of thy righ-teous-ness on-ly.
- 15. Thou, O God, hast taught me from my youth up

- until <u>now</u>: therefore will I tell <u>of</u> thy won-drous works.
- Forsake me not, O God, in mine old age; when I am gray head-ed: until I have shewed thy strength unto this generation; and thy power to all them that are yet for to come.
- 17. Thy righteousness, 0 God, is very high: and great things are they that thou hast done; O God, who is like un-to thee?
- 18.0 what great troubles and adversities hast thou shewed me; and yet didst thou turn and re-fresh me: yea, and broughtest me from the deep of the earth a-gain.
- 19. Thou hast brought me to great ho-nour: and comforted me on ev-ery side.
- 20. Therefore will I praise thee and thy faithfulness, O God; playing upon an instrument of mu - sic: unto thee will I sing upon the harp; 0 thou Holy One of Is-ra-el.
- 21. My lips will be fain when I sing unto thee: and so will my soul whom thou hast de-li-ver-ed.
- 22. My tongue also shall talk of thy righteousness all the day long: for they are confounded and brought unto shame that seek to do me e-vil.

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Then is sung the following Respond, the choir standing up. (But if it is sung in another part of the church the liturgical choir may remain seated.)



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
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8. The mountains al-so shall bring peace: and the little hills righteousness un-to the peo-ple.

14. He shall deliver their souls from false-hood and wrong: and dear shall their blood be is his sight.

15. He shall live, and unto him shall be given of the gold of A-ra-bi-a: prayer shall be made ever unto him; and daily shall he be praised.


16. There shall be an heap of corn in the earth, high up-on the hills: his fruit shall shake like Libanus; and shall be green in the city like grass up-on the earth.

17. His Name shall endure for ever; his Name shall remain under the sun a-mong the pos-teri-ties: which shall be blessed through him; and all the hea-then shall praise him.

18. Blessed be the Lord God; even the God of Is-ra-el: which only do-eth won-drous things.

19. And blessed be the Name of his Majes - ty for ev-er: and all the earth shall be filled with his Majesty. A-men, A-men.







TRU-LY God is loving unto <u>Is-ra-el</u>: even unto such as are <u>of</u> a clean heart.

- 2. Nevertheless, my feet were almost gone: my tread-ings had well nigh slipt.
- 3. And-why I was grieved at the wick-ed: I do also see the ungodly in such pros-pe-ri-ty.
- 4. For they are in no peril of death: but are lus-ty and strong.
- 5. They come in no misfortune like other folk: neither are they pla-gued like o-ther men.
- 6. And this is the cause that they are so holden with pride: and overwhelm-ed with cru-el-ty.
- 7. Their eyes swell with fat-ness: and they do e-ven what they lust.
- 8. They corrupt other, and speak of wicked blasphe-my: their talking is a-gainst the most High.

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- 9. For they stretch forth their mouth unto the <u>heaven</u>: and their tongue go-eth through the world.
- 10. Therefore fall the people unto them: and thereout suck they no small ad-van-tage.
- 11. Tush, say they, how should God per-ceive it: is there knowledge in the most High?
- 12. Lo, these are the ungodly; these prosper in the world, and these have riches in pos-ses-sion: and I said, Then have cleansed my heart in vain, and washed mine hands in in-no-cen-cy.
- 13. All the day long have I been <u>pun</u>-ish-ed: and chastened <u>ev</u>-ery morning.
- 14. Yea, and I had almost said even as they: but lo, then I should have condemned the generation of thy chil-dren.
- 15. Then thought I to understand this: but it was too hard for me;
- 16. Until I went into the sanctuary of God: then understood I the end of these men.
- 17. Namely, how thou dost set them in slippery <u>pla-ces</u>: and castest them down, <u>and</u> de-stroyest them.
- 18. O how suddenly do they con-sume: perish, and come to a fear-ful end.

- 19. Yea, even like as a dream when one a-waketh: so shalt thou make their image to vanish out of the ci-ty.
- 20. Thus my heart was griev-ed: and it went e-ven through my reins.
- 21. So foolish was I and ig-no-rant: even as it were a beast be-fore thee.
- 22. Nevertheless, I am alway by thee: for thou hast holden me by my right hand.
- 23. Thou shall guide me with thy coun-sel: and after that receive me with glo-ry.
- 24. Whom have I in heaven but thee: and there is none upon earth that I desire in compa- \underline{ri} -son of thee.
- 25. My flesh and my heart <u>fail</u>-eth: but God is the strength of my heart, and my por-<u>tion</u> for ev-er.
- 26. For lo, they that forsake thee shall perish: thou hast destroyed all them that commit fornica-tion a-gainst thee.
- 27. But it is good for me to hold me fast by God; to put my trust in the Lord God: and to speak of all thy works in the gates of the daugh-ter of Sy-on.







- O GOD, wherefore art thou absent <u>from</u> us so long: why is thy wrath so hot against the sheep of thy pas-ture?
- 2. O think upon thy con-gre-ga-tion: whom thou hast purchased, and re-deem-ed of old.
- 3. Think upon the tribe of thine in-he-ri-tance: and mount Syon, where-in thou hast dwelt.
- 4. Lift up thy feet, that thou mayest utterly destroy every e-ne-my: which hath done evil in thy sanc-tu-a-ry.

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
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
- 5. Thine adversaries roar in the midst of thy con-gre-ga-tions: and set up their ban-ners for tok-ens.

- 8. They have set fire upon thy ho-ly pla-ces: and have defiled the dwelling-place of thy Name; even un-to the ground.

- 14. Thou didst divide the sea through thy pow-er: thou brakest the heads of the dragons in the wa-ters.

- 15. Thou smotest the heads of the Levia-than in pie-ces: and gavest him to be meat for the people in the wil-der-ness.
- 16. Thou broughtest out fountains and waters out of the hard rocks: thou driedst up mighty wa-ters.
- 17. The day is thine, and the night is thine: thou hast prepared the light and the sun.
- 18. Thou hast set all the <u>bor</u>-ders of the earth: thou hast made sum-mer and win-ter.
- 19. Remember this, O Lord, how the enemy hath re-buk-ed: and how the foolish people hath blas-phem-ed thy Name.
- 20. O deliver not the soul of thy turtle-dove unto the multitude of the e-ne-mies: and forget not the congregation of the poor for ev-er.
- 21. Look up-on the co-ve-nant: for all the earth is full of darkness and cruel ha-bi-ta-tions.
- 22. O let not the simple go a-way a-sham-ed: but let the poor and needy give praise un-to thy Name.
- 28. Arise, O God, main-tain thine own cause: remember how the foolish man blasphe-meth thee dai-ly.
- 24. Forget not the <u>voice</u> of thine e-ne-mies: the presumption of them that hate thee increaseth ey-er more and more.

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
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- 1. UN-TO thee, O God, do we give thanks: yea, unto thee do we give thanks.

- 4. Thou art of more honour and might: than the hills of the rob-bers.
- 5. The proud are robbed; they have slept their sleep: and all the men whose hands were mighty have found no-thing.
- 6. At thy rebuke, O God of <u>Ja</u>-cob: both the chariot and <u>horse</u> are fal-len.

- 7. Thou, even thou, art to be <u>fear-ed</u>: and who may stand in thy sight when thou art an-gry?
- 8. Thou didst cause thy judgement to be heard from hea-ven: the earth trem-bled, and was still,
- 9. When God arose to judge-ment: and to help all the meek up-on earth.
- 10. The fierceness of man shall turn to thy <u>praise</u>: and the fierceness of <u>them</u> shalt thou re-frain.
- 11. Promise unto the Lord your God, and keep it, all ye that are round a-bout him: bring presents unto him that ought to be fear-ed.
- 12. He shall refrain the spirit of <u>prin-ces</u>: and is wonderful among the kings of the earth.

- 8. Is his mercy clean gone for ev-er: and is his promise come utterly to an end for ev-er-more?

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
- 9. Hath God forgotten to be gra-cious: and will he shut up his loving-kindness in dis-plea-sure?

- 20. Thou leddest thy peo-ple like sheep: by the hand of Mo-ses and A-aron.








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
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AT LAUDS



HAVE MER-cy upon me, O God, after thy great good-ness: according to the multitude of thy mercies, do away mine of-fen-ces.

- 2. Wash me throughly from my wick-ed-ness: and cleanse me from my sin.
- 3. For I acknowledge my faults: and my sin is e-ver be-fore me.
- 4. Against thee only have I sinned, and done this evil in thy sight: that thou mightest be justified in thy saying; and clear when thou art judg-ed.
- 5. Behold, I was shapen in wick-ed-ness: and in sin hath my mo-ther con-ceiv-ed me.
- 6. But lo, thou requirest truth in the inward parts: and shalt make me to understand wisdom se-cret-ly.
- 7. Thou shalt purge me with hyssop, and I shall be <u>clean</u>: thou shalt wash me, and I shall be <u>whi</u>ter than snow.
- 8. Thou shalt make me hear of joy and glad-ness: that the bones which thou hast bro-ken may re-joice.
- 9. Turn thy face from my sins: and put out all my mis-deeds.
- 10. Make me a clean heart, O God: and renew a right spi-rit with-in me.

- 11. Cast me not away from thy pre-sence: and take not thy holy Spi-rit from me.
- 12. O give me the comfort of thy help a-gain: and stablish me with thy free spi-rit.
- 13. Then shall I teach thy ways unto the wick-ed: and sinners shall be con-vert-ed un-to thee.
- 14. Deliver me from blood-guiltiness, O God; thou that art the God of my <u>health</u>: and my tongue shall sing <u>of</u> thy righ-teous-ness.
- 15. Thou shalt open my lips, O \underline{Lord} : and my \underline{mouth} shalt show thy praise.
- 16. For thou desirest no sacrifice, else would I give it thee: but thou delightest not in burnt of-fer-ings.
- 17. The sacrifice of God is a troubled spi-rit: a broken and contrite heart, O God, shalt thou not des-pise.
- 18. 0 be favourable and gracious unto \underline{Sy} -on: build thou the walls \underline{of} Je-ru-sa-lem.
- 19. Then shalt thou be pleased with the sacrifice of righteousness; with the burnt offerings and ob-la-tions: then shall they offer young bullocks up-on thine al-tar.

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
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




LORD, THOU hast been our \underline{re} -fuge: from one generation to \underline{a} -no-ther.

- 2. Before the mountains were brought forth; or ever the earth and the world were <u>made</u>: thou art God from everlasting, and world <u>with</u>-out end.
- 8. Thou turnest man to de-struc-tion: again thou sayest; Come again, ye chil-dren of men.
- 4. For a thousand years in thy sight are but as $\underline{\text{yes}}$ -ter-day: seeing that is past as a watch $\underline{\text{in}}$ the night.
- 5. As soon as thou scatterest them they are even as a sleep: and fade away sudden-ly like grass.
- 6. In the morning it is green, and groweth up: but in the evening it is cut down, dried up, and wi-ther-ed.
- 7. For we consume away in thy dis-plea-sure: and are afraid at thy wrathful in-dig-na-tion.
- 8. Thou hast set our misdeeds be-fore thee: and our secret sins in the light of thy coun-te-nance.
- 9. For when thou art angry, all our days are gone: we bring our years to an end, as it were a tale that is told.

- 10. The days of our age are threescore years and ten; and though men be so strong that they come to <u>four</u>-score years: yet is their strength then but labour and sorrow; so soon passeth it away, <u>and</u> we are gone.
- 11. But who regardeth the power of thy wrath: for even thereafter as a man feareth, so is thy dis-plea-sure.
- 12. So teach us to number our days: that we may apply our hearts un-to wis-dom.
- 13. Turn thee again, O Lord, at the <u>last</u>: and be gracious unto thy ser-vants.
- 14. O satisfy us with thy mercy, and that soon: so shall we rejoice and be glad all the days of our life.
- 15. Comfort us again now after the time that thou hast <u>pla-gued</u> us: and for the years wherein we have suffered <u>ad-ver-si-ty</u>.
- 16. Shew thy servants thy work: and their children thy glo-ry.
- 17. And the glorious Majesty of the Lord our God be up-on us: prosper thou the work of our hands upon us; O prosper thou our han-di-work.

- 2. For he flattereth himself in his own sight: until his abominable sin be found out.

- 6. The <u>depths</u> have cov-ered them: they sank into <u>the</u> bot-tom as a stone.

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
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
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- 7. Thy right hand, O Lord, is become glori-ous in pow-er: thy right hand, O Lord, hath dashed in pie-ces the e-ne-my.

- 15. Thou in thy mercy hast led forth the people


- which thou hast re-deem-ed: thou hast guided them in thy strength unto thy ho-ly ha-bi-ta-tion.

- 6. The Lord setteth up the meek: and bringeth the ungodly down to the ground.



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
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
