A participant from Colorado wrote:

At the Symposium, I was incredibly heartened by the emphasis on music's role in the liturgy, both through observing the Mass and Vespers and through the discussions led by Mr Ostrowski and Fr. Popplewell. The more I grow to understand the function of the music in the liturgy, the more I find freedom, not restriction, and renewed drive towards beauty and intention. I found the discussion about hymn translations, tunes, etc. to be very helpful, and I'm looking forward to the fruits of your hymn project with Fr. Popplewell. It was great to practice Gregorian chant and to get more comfortable reading the notation. I'm realizing that I definitely need to learn more about the different modes. I enjoyed being able to talk with others not only about our struggles but about our passion and our hopes for sacred music—it was inspiring and not at all the "let's just complain" camaraderie I have found among many church musicians. The absolute best part of the entire Symposium for me, however, was the glorious Solemn Mass on the last day. The "proof" was right there—the liturgy done properly and beautifully is the ultimate catechesis for me. The reverence of the clergy and the music and the clear emphasis on the Eucharist as "source and summit" brought me to tears many times in that Mass (I confess, I was not able to sing the "Agnus Dei" through my tears, even though it was one of my favorite pieces!) I am now convinced that it is vital to restore sacred music and proper liturgical practice, particularly in the Ordinary Form, in which I work. I was already receiving that direction from prayer, my pastor, and my research, but now I have a new fire underneath me. I feel renewed and ready to do my part!
